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Church Community Services Needs Your Help!

Our community is in great need of your assistance. We all know that the local economy has hit a rough patch. Our residents are struggling with everyday needs. We have seen a 60% increase in visits to the food pantry since the first of the year. Last week alone, 312 people in two days came to stand in line for the pantry. Each guest receives around 70 pounds of food per visit. Those 312 people took home 21,840 pounds of food (about the weight of a school bus) in two days, plus as much produce as they needed.

People asking for financial assistance are getting desperate. When they arrive at CCS, they have exhausted every available option for help. They are struggling with utilities being turned off and the threat of eviction. We try our best to help their situation, but we are short of the funds to help them.

When the economy in Elkhart County turns down, Church Community Services visits go up. Our lines will only get longer. We need to be able to help our most vulnerable residents weather this storm, but we cannot serve them without the generosity of our community.

On his way to volunteer at an event, Councilman Dwight Fish stopped at our table at the Elkhart Farmers Market to talk to us about his support for Seed to Feed. He tells us that it's because of the people at CCS "who make it fun and exciting and important to be involved in such a grassroots community embrace, if you will. To know that there are people out there that support their fellow citizens with food, fellowship, and training and, overall, just good friendship. It's a good place for me to fit in because I'm all about feeding people. No one should go hungry in this world. We do food delivery very well at Church Community Services/Seed to Feed. It's important for me at a couple of really grassroots levels because I grew up on a farm. I know how important food is. I know how important the Midwest area is in delivering that food to the world. And we are a small part of that, in the city of Elkhart, but our reach has been quite broad. I meet people from all over who know about us because of the work we're doing and the work you're doing."

Councilman Fish encourages everyone to get involved in their own way. "Join. Be a member. Participate. Volunteer. Plant some food and bring it over to us. Let us know how you feel about us in your actions. And I'm not just saying that; that's not just platitude. That's why I show up and do what I do and that's why, as a city councilperson, I want to assist you in your greenhouse development with anything I can through the city, but I'm also a volunteer at the sidewalk level, if you will. I walk into the (CCS) offices, and I'm welcomed. I walk into the greenhouse, and I can get my hands dirty. I participate in food distribution, and it makes me very happy."

Many Hands Make Light Work At Seed To Feed

Garden affirmation for August (and those oh-so-slow tomatoes) "Everyone is growing at their own rate, in their right time; you're the exact right size and shape for this moment. Keep going. Keep growing."

It's harvest season at Seed to Feed and our community gardens are filling our pantry with the freshest of produce! We have collected a total of 35,557 pounds of vegetables and fruit this year! That's approximately the weight of 6 elephants! What an impact to our community's food insecurity! At Seed to Feed it all starts with the seeds, but it's the countless volunteers that help along the way, at the community gardens, and in the greenhouses and pantry that make the magic happen. A big thank you to all of our community that helped make our growing season such a success.

We have a few updates from our gardens here at CCS. The first is our new Community Garden Nights. We are meeting here at our gardens every Tuesday night, from 5:30 to 7:00, to work alongside our neighbors here in our gardens. We harvest, fellowship, and work together so that our community can be a part of the action and learn about gardening along the way. We will be wrapping up our Community Garden evenings on September 5th for the season, but we look forward to bringing them back next Spring.

We are in the home stretch of our Greenhouse Expansion Project. Thank you to the crews and volunteers that have been dedicated through this weather and heat, and just keep chugging along with construction. We look forward to having crops in the ground this September and throughout the Winter. What a blessing it will be to have fresh produce year round for our pantry guests. Thank you as well to the team at Clay Bottom Farms for teaching us along the way as we bring lean farming to CCS.

Seed to Feed is in the middle of our volunteer campaign, and we are looking to bring our friends and new faces into the garden and our campus. Graduation is always a special time of sharing. The volunteers and staff have an opportunity to share about how proud they are of all the work that the women have put in over the 5 months.

Sue McDonald, Soup of Success counselor, shared that "In the beginning, the class assessments showed that all of the women had fairly low self-esteem and that their level of hope was almost nil.

The guests can also take the microphone and share about the changes they see in their graduate and how happy they are for them. Parents, friends, significant others, all shared encouraging words and their pride. One little girl delightedly grabbed the mic and said exuberantly, "Great job, Mommy!"

The most impactful part of graduation is when the women themselves share about the changes they have seen in themselves. "I'm going to take all of their (SOS Staff) patience, effort and kindness - everything they've taught me - and carry it forever. I've learned that my past doesn't have to define me. That it doesn't matter what others think of me, it matters what I think of myself. How you feel about yourself reflects on how you treat others. I'm always looking at the big picture. What we put out is what we get back. Like the Soup of Success women. Somehow, someway I'm going to make this world a better place. Yes, I am important, but it's not just about me. So, from the bottom of my heart, thank you from the women that came before me and that will come after me. I will continue to tell the story of my path to empowerment because women need other women! Thank you all."


